Wild Card

Oktoberfest entertainment will be provided this year by the band Wild Card. Wild Card band members have many years of combined experience playing a variety of music throughout Central Virginia. When they say they do a little bit of everything, that's exactly what you are going to get. From Creedence Clearwater and Van Morrison, to Miranda Lambert and Lady Antebellum, and everything in between, all of your favorite songs will be brought to life with lively rhythm and tight harmonies.

The musicians in the Wild Card band are: Chase DeWitt (guitar & vocals); Ashley Carter (guitar & vocals); Ricky Robertston (drums & vocals); and Bob Harvey (bass & vocals). Chase DeWitt began playing guitar in the early '90s and joined the local band Doubleshot as lead guitarist. In 2006 he and his sister-in-law, Ashley, started the duo Chasin' Ashley and performed covers and originals throughout the Lynchburg area. Chase also served as the lead guitarist for Off The Cuff Band before he and Ashley decided to expand the duo to a full four piece group. Singer/songwriter Ashley Carter, a self-taught guitarist, has a BFA in musical theater and has performed from Atlanta to New York. Ashley plays an energetic rhythm guitar and is the band's lead vocalist. She also has several original compositions that the band performs periodically. Her energy both on and off stage is contagious and guarantees an exciting performance. Ricky Robertson started playing drums in the '60s and has played in several bands over the years. In 1990, Ricky and his brother formed the band Doubleshot, an eight piece rock/soul band that opened for such acts as Junior Walker and The All Stars, The Drifters, and Bill Deal and The Rhondells. After 18 years, the band Doubleshot retired. Ricky was approached by Chase and Ashley with an opportunity to play something a little different and now provides not only the beat but great vocals. Bob Harvey has also played with numerous local bands over the years and has recently joined Wild Card to bring his enthusiasm for bass and vocals to this dynamic group.

We made it through a brutal summer!! The weather was the hottest it has been in my 15 years as a golf pro, and for a while the course, and especially the greens, were feeling the stress of all the hot days and nights. But Mike (the course superintendent) and his crew worked long and hard and got everything healthy again by the first of September.

As we head into fall, you will probably see the course look the best it has ever looked. The greens are almost fully healed from the September aerification, and overseeding has begun. The Bermuda grass fairways were fuller this season than ever, but with the first frost they will go dormant and turn brown. But we are already overseeding the fairways, so the seasonal rye will be greening up on fairways and tees before the bermuda grass browns. And we are putting more seed out this year than in years, so you will be seeing green for

the months ahead.

So not only will you enjoy the beauty driving by, but playing the course will be even more fun. While many people hang up the clubs in the fall, this may be the best time of year to use them. The weather in October is usually crisp and clear, and all of our weekly activities are continuing through the month. If you are considering joining Ivy Hill Golf Club, this is also a great time. We have some really good fall and winter joining incentives.

Identity Theft - Mike Brown, Sheriff, Bedford County

One of the fastest growing crimes is identity theft. Identity theft occurs when someone uses your personal identifying information, like your name, Social Security number, or credit card number, without your permission to commit fraud or other crimes. The crime takes many forms. Identity thieves may rent an apartment, obtain a credit card, or establish a telephone account in your name. Identity theft is serious. While some identity theft victims can resolve their problems quickly, others spend hundreds of dollars and many days repairing damage to their good name and credit record.

Identity theft starts with the misuse of your personal such as your name and Social Security number, credit card numbers, or other financial account information. Skilled identity thieves may use a variety of methods to get hold of your information, including:

- Dumpster Diving They rummage through trash looking for bills or other paper with your personal information on it.
- Changing Your Address They divert your billing statements by completing a change of address form.



 Stealing - They steal wallets and purses; mail, including bank and credit card statements; preapproved credit offers; and new checks or tax information.

Deter identity thieves by safeguarding your information:

- Shred financial documents with personal information before you discard them.
- Protect your Social Security number. Don't carry your Social Security card in your wallet or

- write your Social Security number on a check.
- Don't give out personal information on the phone, through the mail, or over the Internet unless you know who you are dealing with.
- Don't use an obvious password like your birth date or the last four digits of your Social Security number.
- Keep your personal information in a secure place at home.

If you suspect you are an identity theft victim, immediately cancel credit cards and contact your bank to stop payments. Then, contact the sheriff's office so that we can begin an immediate investigation.

Roadway Maintenance

You may have noticed a crew working on the curb at the main Ivy Hill entrance in late August. They repaired the snow plow damage from the winter of 2009-2010. Thank you VDOT!

Littering along Ivy Hill roadways remains a problem. VDOT denied our request for anti-littering signs along Quail Ridge Drive due to budget limitations. Dog Attacks

About a month ago, a family cat was attacked on Lake Ridge Drive and severely injured by a large black dog with wavy hair weighing between 50 and 70 pounds wearing a collar with a shiny tag. Unfortunately, the cat has since passed away. The attack occurred around 3:00 AM and was witnessed by a neighbor who managed to chase the dog away. Three weeks previously, another pet cat was attacked and killed during the night in front of the owner's house on their driveway at another Lake Ridge Drive address. Earlier this summer a large dog attacked and killed a pet cat on Ivy Place. That attack also occurred during the night. More recently, one of the cats that lived at the Ivy Hill Realty office was killed under similar circumstances. No one witnessed the latter incidents. However, the similarity in timing and the geographic proximity of the four attacks makes it likely that the same dog was responsible. If you have a cat or other small pet, you may want to keep them in at night until this dog is caught.
