Ivy Hill History

Quail Ridge Drive was the first road constructed in the original residential section of Ivy Hill after the entranceway (Ivy Hill Drive). The upper photo to the right shows the early stages of the process. The curb has been installed at the corner at the top of Quail Ridge hill, the roadway has been graded down the hill and around the corner onto Hitching Post Lane, and the first course of crusher run has been laid in.

The lower photo shows the same view as it looks today. Quail Ridge Drive is of course much longer. However, even the original short section down the hill to Hitching Post has changed so much with the addition of the Ivy Place neighborhood to the left half way down the hill and Club Terrace to the right near the bottom of the hill. In the earlier photo the land was heavily wooded where both of those neighborhoods are now.

Oktoberfest

Planning for this year's Oktoberfest is already underway. The date has been set for Saturday, October 11th (neither Virginia Tech or UVA play home games on that date) and the location will once again be the Ivy Hill pool pavilion. The starting and ending times will also be the same as last year; 5:00 pm and 8:00 pm respectively. Watch our website (ivyhill-forest.org) for additional details.

Previous Oktoberfest events have been free for all Ivy Hill residents; only guests from outside the neighborhood have been charged admission. However, the cost of staging the event keeps increasing every year. So the organizers are considering charging all non-members of the hosting organizations (the Ivy Hill Homeowners Association and the Ivy Hill Ladies Association) who attend this year. If you are thinking of participating in this fun event in October and have not yet joined one of these fine community organizations, maybe now would be a good time to do so!

Where Are the Bears?

The mother bear and her two cubs haven't been reported in the neighborhood so far this spring. They should have come out of hibernation by now. Hopefully, they have moved on.

The Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries says black bears have a natural distrust of humans, are shy and avoid people, but they are attracted to food sources in residential areas. To help keep bears wild, DGIF recommends people learn all they can about black bears and to take these steps:

- Remove bird feeders when the winter is over.
- Store garbage in a shed or closed garage or a bear-proof container.
- Feed pets indoors or no more than they'll eat in a single feeding.
- Do not put meat scraps in a compost pile.
- Remove ripe fruit from trees and the surrounding grounds.
- Clean your grill often, burn off the grease and do not dump the drippings in your yard.
- Install electric fencing to protect beehives, dumpsters, gardens, compost piles and other food sources.
- Harass bears. Paintball guns are nonlethal and won't hurt a bear.

Talk to your neighbors so they too are aware of ways to prevent bears from causing problems.





Ivy Lake Update

The following update was provided by Lisa Rubilar of the Ivy Hill Ladies Association and edited and approved by Anne Klokow. It summarizes the information that Anne Klokow of the lakeshore property owner's communication committee presented to the IHLA at their meeting last month. This article does not represent the position of the Ivy Hill Homeowners Association on this issue.

Anne began by saying that Ivy Hill and the surrounding neighborhoods were built on the prestige of Ivy Lake and the golf course. The loss of the lake would affect the value of all property in the area. In addition, many property owners have found themselves unable to sell due to this unresolved issue.

She then said that the lake issue began in February 2013, when LU was informed by the DCR that the lvy Lake dam would have to be improved to meet safety requirements, or would have to be breached. LU wanted 85 lakefront homeowners to split the cost of dam renovation, which was estimated to be between \$2.5 and \$3 million. Homeowners thought this was unfair and unrealistic. One issue is that all homeowners in the area share in the benefits of the lake, not just a few dozen owners whose property directly abuts it. If the dam were breached, access would be altered to the neighborhoods beyond the dam. However DCR requirements to breach the dam are implemented, the resulting road would differ from the existing one over the dam. Access would be difficult during the construction/destruction process. In addition, flooding would resume downstream, which was a problem prior to the dam's being built.

Anne stated that media coverage hasn't provided accurate information about the lake issue. Homeowners have not felt well-treated by LU throughout this process. For instance, without warning, LU announced that it would begin lowering the lake. Anne said that it is not true that the DCR required this lowering of the lake. Homeowners feel that LU is now draining the lake in order to show them what it will be like if the dam is removed. The lake had been lowered 8½ to 9 feet by early April.

Anne reported that at a meeting with the Ivy Lake committee members in September last year, LU offered to pay \$1million toward the dam renovation (which is its new estimate of the cost), and is asking shoreline property owners to then assume responsibility for the dam and the lake's maintenance. LU wants to maintain a presence on the lake. There was a handshake on this idea, but LU was to provide a written proposal within a couple of days. When LU sent the proposal four months later, it was different in the particulars from what the homeowners felt they had agreed to, so the shorefront homeowners at a meeting turned it down. They felt that LU would continue to enjoy all of the benefits of the lake, with none of the costs or liability.



Anne said that most parties would like this issue to be resolved as soon as possible so that property owners don't continue to suffer. A few want to wait for proposed state legislation, which would change dam safety rules. However, from what Anne has seen, those rules would not affect Ivy Lake dam, and it would not be worth it to wait for another study that won't be completed until late 2015.

Anne's committee is working on making estimates of the real costs of assuming lake and dam ownership, in preparation for responding to LU's latest proposal. However, Anne said that LU is now reaching out only to homeowners who have not expressed a negative opinion on the lake transition.
