IHHA President's Message

The Association has been performing a lot of work around the community this summer. The trees at the main entrance have been pruned. The ground around the LakePointe sign was cleaned up and an American flag was added to that entrance. Electrical problems at the main entrance to Ivy Hill were discovered. Some electrical work has been performed on the lights and electrical service on the walls and gazebo. More work is needed. The damage was significant and so was the price tag. See the articles on Pages 2 and 3 of this Newsletter.

The Board recently met with deputies from the Bedford County Sheriff's Department to discuss neighborhood safety. The main thing that everyone in the neighborhood can do is to watch for things that are out of place. Things like strange cars or people on your street. We will be running a series of articles on community safety. The first article can be found on Page 7 of this Newsletter.

The membership drive is still on. You have seen the signs at the entrances. We have 289 members to date. This is down by about 30 from last year and is less than half of the total homeowners in the Ivy Hill community. There is an article on Page 5 about membership that shows the number of members and percentage by streets. We need your help. Please talk to your neighbors and find out if they are members. If not, talk to them about the advantages of being members.

Just a reminder, the Ivy Hill Reservations and Restrictions are for everyone in Ivy Hill, not just the members of the Ivy Hill Homeowners Association. The R&R are on our website: ivyhill-forest.org.

The Octoberfest event is being canceled this year because of these unexpected costs and lower membership. We hope to have it next year.

There is little news about the fate of Ivy Lake. Liberty has filed a document in the Circuit Court of Bedford County to save the lake and form a Lake Association for those who live around the lake and those who have to use the dam to get to their homes. The case is in the early stages of the legal process. The Case No. is CL16000266-00.

Major Electrical Repairs Underway

In the September 2015 Newsletter we reported on the new lighting that the Ivy Hill Homeowners Association installed on the sign and serpentine walls at the Ivy Hill main entrance. We also reported on some minor masonry repairs that our volunteers made to the serpentine walls themselves. We hoped that those improvements would hold us for many years to come. Alas, that was not to be.

The problems began this spring with the timer going bad that controlled the lights. Replacing the timer with a photo sensor solved that problem, but then the generations-old service wire, meter base, and breaker box were found to have deteriorated to the point of being a hazard. The service wire had come loose from the 1935 pole. Water was entering the meter base and finding its way into the breaker box, tripping the breakers and causing the lights to go out. The breaker box was not grounded as per code. The water had also caused severe deterioration of the electrical contacts in the meter base and breaker box.



Enter Chuck Dyba and his team at Unlimited Electrical Contracting (formerly Gaddy Electric in Goode). A new pole, service wire, meter base, breaker box, and junction housing were installed providing a thorough and safe upgrade of electrical service.

However, then an inspection revealed that the neutral wire going to the gazebo and north wall had apparently been severed at some time in the past. More critically, the problem had been "fixed" by tying the neutral at the gazebo to a ground rod, thus creating an extremely hazardous configuration. Since this condition did not pass inspection, the power to the gazebo, the lvy Hill sign, and the north wall was turned off in May.

A "sweep" of the underground line from the service pole to the gazebo was then conducted to locate the fault. It was determined that the cable was not installed in a conduit as it should have been even back then, and that standard above ground house wiring had been used rather than direct-burial cable. Consequently, the wiring had badly deteriorated. Moreover, the junction boxes that were used were not intended for outdoor service either, and were improperly "sealed" with grout.



None of this would pass code. So at this point it was decided that there was no choice but to replace everything. This involved boring under both roadways and the median "island" and putting in a flexible conduit into which new wires will be run to the walls and the gazebo.



The boring was completed in July at a cost of approximately \$2,000. The estimated cost of the cable and completing the rest of electrical hookup is \$3,400. So the total anticipated cost is \$5,400.

Thank you to Bob Harvey for taking the lead on this major electrical refurbishment project.

June Work Party

On Saturday morning, June 25th, a dozen IHHA volunteers gathered on the "island" at the main Ivy Hill entrance. They pruned the low-hanging branches on the trees along the median, cut off all the suckers that sprouted at the base of the trees since last year, and did some minor repairs at the gazebo and entrance sign.

LakePointe Sign

Just in time for the Fourth of July, the IHHA mounted a flag holder to the elaborate brickwork of the beautiful sign at the LakePointe entrance and installed a brand new American flag. IHHA volunteers also checked out the electrical system at the sign, weeded the plantings in front of the sign, and removed a scrub bush that was blocking access to the electrical outlet and circuit box behind the entrance sign.



Oktoberfest 2016 Cancelled

Due to the extraordinary expenses associated with the Ivy Hill main entrance electrical repairs reported in the article that begins on Page 2 of this Newsletter, the Oktoberfest event that was tentatively scheduled for Saturday, October 8th has been cancelled.

Lunch Bunch



Ann and Jim's home backs up to the 14th fairway. In 1977, the famous entertainer Bob Hope was playing an exhibition round at Ivy Hill. On the 14th hole he hooked his tee shot out of bounds. Ann was right there. When



he drove up to where the ball was, he asked her "How does it look?" She responded "It's round and white and has dimples". Later that day he used that line as a joke when talking to some men at the 18th hole.



Neighborhood Security

In a booklet that accompanied a recent letter from Sheriff Mike Brown several things are suggested that you can do to keep your home, your belongings, your family, and the Ivy Hill community safer including the following:
