IHHA President's Message

Fall is here. The weather is getting cooler and leaves are turning colors and falling. This is just a reminder to keep your lawns and yards nice. By maintaining the outside of your property and your dwelling, you are respecting your neighbors and the Ivy Hill community.

IHHA has been asked to get involved in Bedford County activities that involve the Ivy Hill community. At the last Board meeting, we decided to take up this challenge. One of the things that we are targeting is a meeting of the Bedford County Planning Commission. This is the five year review of their comprehensive plan. We plan to attend. If there are any issues we need to be aware of, let us know. The Planning Commission public meeting for our area will be held at the Bedford Library on November 30 from 5:30 to 8:30 pm.

Ivy Hill is a deed restricted community. There is a sentence in your deed which states: "The property hereby conveyed is conveyed subject to all ... restrictions heretofore imposed upon said property ... now binding thereon." The restrictions were imposed by the Developer of your neighborhood, not the IHHA. We cannot change them and they are enforceable by law. So regardless of whether you belong to the IHHA or not, all restrictions that remain in effect apply to your property. The Reservations & Restrictions that are applicable to your neighborhood can be found on the Ivy Hill web site ivyhill-forest.org under Planning\Homeowner Association\Ivy Hill\Ivy Hill Restrictions.

The Architectural Committee has to be contacted before you perform new construction or outside projects like a deck or a pouch. Sharon Mahon Padowicz is the Architectural Committee chairman. Lost & Found Pets

If you have lost or found a pet, be sure to let us know at <u>ivyhillforest@gmail.com</u>. While it is fine to reach out to the community using social media such as the IHHA facebook page, Hitching Post Neighborhood, or Next Door; not everyone is on those sites. We can reach over 500 Ivy Hill residents via a community email alert. It is best if you can include a photograph of the pet.

Also, found dogs need to be captured and restrained for the alert to be effective. Our internet provider limits us to 100 emails an hour. So at best at least six hours will elapse before everyone has received the notice in their IN basket. An unrestrained dog can wander for many miles in six hours. Consequently, we have found that it is ineffective to report visual sightings of stray dogs to the community at large.

Cats are another matter. They don't tend to wander very far and hang around the local area especially if you put out food for them. So even if you can't catch and restrain a stray cat, offer it food, and go ahead and report it.

If you do catch and restrain a stray dog, and we can't find the owner right away, we suggest trying to have it scanned before you turn it over to the Bedford County Animal Shelter. Ridgewood Animal Hospital up in Forest will scan it for free. If the dog has an embedded microchip, the odds of locating the owner go up substantially.

Ivy Hill History

The October 6, 1851 issue of the *Lynchburg Virgini*an Newspaper contains an article reporting that Paul Clay, identified in the article as a "prominent farmer near Forest" has employed a lady to teach his children. He announces that he will accept a few young lady borders who wish to attend classes with them. The borders will be charged \$10 a month and will receive instruction in English, French, Latin, Italian, embroidery, piano, and guitar.

Paul Clay was a descendent of the Reverend Charles Clay, the rector of the Episcopal Church in Bedford County, who purchased a tract of land adjacent to Thomas Jefferson's Poplar Forest in 1756. The tract became known as Ivy Hill. Apparently, this school was at Ivy Hill.

In 1883 a small one-room school house was built on Route 221. Miss Mary Goode, a niece of the Honorable John Goode, was the first teacher there. About 1903 another room was added. The building in later years was used as a dwelling. It was finally demolished in 1993.

About 1916 a new school was built with three rooms in downtown Forest across from the Methodist Church. Much later the school was brick veneered and a kitchen and one other room were added. Grades one through seven were taught in those rooms. Any student wishing further education had to go to New London Academy. This building is still standing. It now houses an antique business.

Holiday Decorations

Winter Mites

The Virginia Cooperative Extension suggests you be on the lookout for winter mites as the weather gets colder. Winter mites aren't anything like spider mites. They are dark brown to almost black with red legs as adults. In addition to food crops such as wheat, barley, and oats; other hosts include bluegrass, bentgrass, rye grass, and fescue – i.e., most lvy Hill lawns. While no winter mites have yet been reported in lvy Hill this season, they have already been spotted in orchard grass elsewhere in Bedford County.
