Boy, is it hot this summer already! We have a summer party planned for Saturday, August 31, 5:00-7:00.



Ivy Hill Architectural Committee

The Ivy Hill Architectural Committee was created by Allen Harvey. It reviews and approves the plans for all new-build construction, major renovations, additions, improvements, and mass plantings in the original Ivy Hill development. It also serves the neighborhoods that he developed later that also use the general Ivy Hill Reservations & Restrictions. They can be found on your Ivy Hill Website (ivyhill-forest.org) under Planning tab at Homeowner Association\lvy Hill\lvy Hill Restrictions. Some Ivy Hill neighborhoods that were developed by other developers have separate Restrictions and their own Architectural Committee or other compliance mechanism; but all Ivy Hill neighborhoods were created as deed restricted developments. Most of these later restrictions can also be found on the Website under the same tab by clicking on your neighborhood. If you are unsure as to which Ivy Hill neighborhood you live in or which Restrictions apply to your property, take a look at the color-coded

map that is also posted under the Planning tab. Select the last option Ivy Hill Map on the pull-down menu. If the restrictions for your neighborhood are not listed, contact your neighborhood HOA.

The general Ivy Hill Reservations & Restrictions and the equivalent Restrictions of the various Ivy Hill neighborhoods that came later have been applied differently at different times over their histories. Also, times have changed, and the original developers did not anticipate fiber-optic cable and direct-to-home satellite communications, internet-empowered remote work, solar power, or some of the other aspects of modern life when they drafted the Restrictions a half-century ago. If you have any questions about how the Restrictions apply to your home and property, contact the Ivy Hill Architectural Committee before you start planning any changes. Likewise, if you live in a neighborhood that has separate Restrictions and you are thinking about making changes, contact your neighborhood HOA or local Architectural Committee as soon as possible.

Ivy Hill History

In the 1970s and 1980s when Ivy Hill was being actively developed, the community had many unique benefits and traditions that have since been discontinued. Here's what we have lost!

- Private golf carts.
- Wooden street signs & mailbox posts handmade by Mr. Dobbins.
- Ivy Hill Airport.
- Cattle on Ivy Creek and knee-high hay in the golf course roughs to feed them.
- A private water system fed by a tower behind the 11th green.
- A giant community Christmas tree made by stringing lights from that tower.
- Community carol sing-alongs around the tower-tree every Christmas.
- Luminaries lined the streets of Ivy Hill at Christmas.
- Easter egg hunt.
- Pool parties in the summer and frequent community social events year round.
- Free July 4th fireworks on the driving range.
- TV antenna in the attic that could only pick up three over-the-air stations on a good day.
- A working irrigation system and standard-voltage floodlights all along the main entrance island.
- And after Ivy Lake was constructed, lake access for the whole community.

Some of these things have gone by because of the inevitable march of progress. However, many others have died because we no longer act together as a community. Too many new residents move in, live on the internet, and never speak to their neighbors. Less than half of Ivy Hill residents join the IHHA to help maintain the public spaces and light the entrances. Only a tiny fraction of Ivy Hill ladies join the IHLA and help organize social events.
